This COVID-19 Helpline is funded by the Government of Canada, United Way and Indus Community Services and managed by the Council of Agencies Serving South Asians (CASSA) in partnership with the South Asian Legal Clinic of Ontario, Tamil Canadian Centre for Civic Action, Bangladeshi Canadian Community Services, South Asian Women's Rights Organization, and Punjabi Community Health Services.

The COVID-19 Helpline provides information about health & safety during COVID-19, details on the reopening process, government benefits, and support services available to communities in **English, Hindi, Urdu, Tamil, Bengali and Punjabi.** Recorded information is available on the Helpline 24/7 and live Intake Specialists are available 7 days a week. 

The **Coalition for Racial Equity in Education** is continuing to work on strengthening community engagement and training our student and parents volunteers in capacity building and advocacy skills. We are holding monthly student and parent volunteer meetings to connect with the community and obtain insights on project activities. The next **Student meeting** is **Tuesday, May 25th, 2021**, and will be a focus group- style collaborative event to discuss the impacts of COVID-19 on online education. The next **Parent meeting** is **Tuesday, May 18th, 2021**, and will also feature a focus group to allow volunteers to share their experiences with the ongoing pandemic.

CREE is holding a **training weekend** on **Saturday, May 15th, and Sunday May 16th, 2021**, to introduce Anti-Racism and Anti-oppression training for student and parent volunteers. This weekend will also include an Introduction to Advocacy Training, presented by the Urban Alliance on Race Relations. The Advocacy Training will help volunteers understand how advocacy works at the school board level, and how communities can collaborate with elected officials to institute policies of change. There will also be a Volunteer Appreciation session on Sunday, May 16th, which will include fun games, icebreakers, lively discussions, and food vouchers, in an effort to show our volunteers how much we appreciate their commitment. 



The Youth in Policing Initiative runs in partnership with the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services. Over the course of the program students will engage in positive productive activities in a safe and healthy environment.

This is a **paid** student position running for 8 weeks, 28-35 hours/week, Mondays to Thursdays. The initial start date will be on <u>July 5, 2021</u> and end on <u>August 26, 2021</u>. The 2021 Summer Initiative will be entirely online, with the possibility of in-person days depending on COVID-19 guidelines issued by the Government of Ontario.

The goal of the Youth in Policing Initiative is to inspire young people to look at the many different aspects of policing and to empower students to become ambassadors of change in the community of Durham.

To qualify for the Youth in Policing Initiative Student position, applicants must:

In This Together - Survey



'Fight racism in all forms': How you can help Asian communities right now

As of Saturday afternoon, Fight COVID Racism was reporting 959 incidents of anti-Asian hate crimes across Canada during the pandemic. Here are five ways to help if you witness hate, according to the organization:

- Take action: Approach the targeted person, introduce yourself and offer support.

- Actively listen: Ask before taking any actions and respect the other person's wishes. Monitor the situation if needed.

- Ignore the attacker: Using your discretion, Stop AAPI Hate says to attempt to calm the situation by using your voice, body language or distractions.

- Accompany: If the situation escalates, invite the targeted person to join you in leaving the area.

- Offer emotional support: Help the other person by asking how they're feeling and assist them in figuring out what they want to do next. <u>Read more.</u>
