

In the previous month, UARR organized a summit on racial justice, during which we delved into both the achievements of our project and the tasks that lie ahead. Significant conversations took place, underscoring the vital importance of ensuring schools as secure havens for everyone. At present, our parent and youth volunteers are actively participating in training sessions and workshops aimed at deepening their understanding of their encounters with Islamophobia. These initiatives will also equip them with effective strategies for addressing instances of Islamophobia should they arise within the school environment.

Impact of Bill 21 Increased Hate Crimes

The Bill has added to an increase in hate crimes inflicted on minority groups all over Canada. A federal study in 2021 found that hate crimes targetting Muslims in Canada had jumped by 71%.
